Le concept d'eupéanisation s'est imposé comme un concept à succès dans le champ des études européennes. Toutefois, si les travaux sur ce thème se sont multipliés, ils restent le plus souvent marqués par de nombreux coins d'ombre. La plupart des recherches achoppent sur un triple écueil. Elles regroupent tout d'abord deux littératures qui dialoguent peu. D'un côté, une littérature anglophone qui s'est attachée à conceptualiser la notion d'eupéanisation. De l'autre, une littérature francophone, plus sociologique, qui juxtapose des travaux empiriques, parfois au détriment d'une conceptualisation poussée. Enfin, les études sur l'eupéanisation peinent à proposer une montée en généralité susceptible de nous informer des effets politiques et sociaux structurels de l'intégration européenne.

Compte tenu de ces écueils, l'objectif de la ST est de réinscrire les recherches sur l'eupéanisation dans une perspective plus large. Cet effort de normalisation des études européennes suppose de rompre avec la posture considérant l'Union européenne comme un phénomène *sui generis*. Les communications attendues seront théoriques ou empiriques. Elles proposeront une discussion sur les apports et les limites de la notion d'eupéanisation. Théoriques, elles éviteront de reproduire un nouvel état de l'art au profit d'une ouverture accrue sur les approches classiques de science politique. Empiriques, elles veilleront à ne pas offrir une simple étude de cas mais à discuter les résultats obtenus à l'aune d'autres recherches empiriques et approches et méthodes de science politique.

Une attention particulière sera accordée aux problématiques suivantes :

1. *Les sources de l'eupéanisation* : comment différencier l'influence de l'Union européenne de celle exercée par la mondialisation, d'autres institutions internationales ou encore d'autres États ? Cette question est liée à celles de la causalité et de la corrélation dans les études sur l'eupéanisation. Comment penser le passage d'une causalité séquentielle et unidirectionnelle à un modèle de causalité intriqué supposant que les niveaux nationaux, européen et international interagissent en permanence ?
2. *Le non-changement du niveau national* : comment penser et étudier empiriquement l'absence de changement au niveau national ? Si cette attitude a été étudiée sous forme de résistances au changement aussi bien d'un point de vue de politique, de sociologie et de pensée politique, il est pertinent d'élargir la réflexion. Quels enseignements peut-on tirer des travaux en ce domaine ? Dans quelle mesure les études sur les résistances à l'intégration européenne ont-elles contribué à enrichir la science politique ?

The conference proposes to establish a state-of-the-art parliamentary study in France, on the occasion of the termination of the LEGIPAR project funded by the French ANR. The conference will be structured in three succeeding thematic sessions (half a day and four papers each, see below) allowing a discussion between one keynote speaker, four paper-givers and one discussant. All keynote speakers and discussants mentioned in this call have confirmed their participation.

The conference is open to all researchers working on the French parliament or MPs (including members of the European Parliament), or looking at parliamentary representation from a comparative perspective including France, whatever the methods and the theoretical approaches. Priority will be given to papers based on original data and providing empirical results.

Working language will be English.

The Jean Monnet European Center of Excellence of the University of Rome "Tor Vergata" is organizing the 8th edition of the Jean Monnet International Summer Seminars "Integrating Europe in a Changing World". The Summer Seminars is divided into two modules that can also be taken individually.

The EU Institutions and Decision Making after the Lisbon Treaty (Rome 4-8 July 2011)

This first module will focus on the changes introduced by the Lisbon Treaty in the EU institutions and decision making procedures, also assessing the effectiveness of the new (reduced) rotating presidency, the EU President and the complex relations between these and the EU Commission President and the EU High Representative and. It will be an exciting hands-on course analyzing the changes introduced by the Lisbon Treaty both from a theoretical and practical point of view.

The EU Foreign Policy after the Lisbon Treaty (Rome 11-15 July 2011)

The second module will focus on the EU Foreign Policy. In particular, this year we will assess the degree of convergence / divergence of the Foreign Policy of the Union with that of its major member states and of the world superpowers and emerging powers (US, Russia, China, India, Brazil). As usual, it will have a hands-on approach thanks to the participation of the best scholars and decision makers in the field.

The Summer Seminars are unique in the way they are thought and organized: students will interact with some 30 world class speakers that have included Giuliano Amato (Former Italian Prime Minister and Vice President of the European Convention); Franco Frattini (Italian Foreign Minister); Andrew Moravcsik, (Princeton); Simon Hix (LSE); Marta Dassu, (Aspen Institute); Joaquim Roy (University of Miami); Gilles De Kerkove (EU Coordinator for Counterterrorism), Jeremy Shapiro (US Department of State); Amy Verdun, (University of Victoria), David Andrews (Scripps College), Jan Techau (NATO Defence College), Fernando Gentilini (EEAS), Ian Ifversen (Aarhus University), John Peet (The Economist), Khalid Emara (Egyptian Foreign Ministry), Alfred Tovas (Hebrew University of Jerusalem), Mark Entin (Moscow State University), Amichai Magen (Stanford University) and many other top other national and international scholars and decision makers.

The Summer Seminars address primarily to graduate and PhD students and young civil servants, but they can also be useful for journalists, diplomats, people working in NGOs, interest groups, etc. Exceptionally skilled senior undergraduate students can be accepted on an individual base. The seminars are highly selective and intensive, with 30 teaching hours each week, giving right to 4 ECTS / 2 US credits each. Admission is subordinated to the proof of previous knowledge about the EU. In the past editions of the summer seminar, approximately 35% of the applicants have been accepted.

The tuition fee is of 600€ per week and 1000€ for both weeks. 3 full scholarships and 3 partial scholarships are available and will be awarded on the basis of merit and need. **2011 Virginia Summer School on Interest Groups Politics: Global Advocacy,
University of Virginia, 4-11 July 2011**

The Summer School on Interest Group Politics is a new initiative of the ECPR Standing Group on Interest Groups. Three schools, to be organized in 2010-2011-2012, aim to provide students of political science and public administration sound knowledge about these organized interests and their impact on public policy making.

The 2nd Annual Summer School on Interest Group Politics will be hosted at the Batten School of Leadership & Public Policy at the University of Virginia (US) July 4-11, 2011. This is the first time an ECPR summer school has ever been held outside Europe – it is fitting that the ECPR Standing Group on Interest Groups would organize this summer school just outside of Washington DC - the other major global power center - since this year's theme is "Global Advocacy."

Policies emanating from the EU and the US have global impacts – these two power centers set global standards, shape global institutions, influence global markets, and determine global politics. It is critical students of advocacy have a better understanding of the important new developments and strategies of lobbying on global issues and in international arenas.

Drawing on the expertise of some of the most influential scholars working on the topic, the 2011 Summer School will explore the strategies and influence of interest groups engaged on "global issues" whether those groups are targeting policymakers in the US, the EU; the WTO, the UN, the IMF, the World Bank, multinational corporations (MNCs) or third country governments, especially those countries with less than democratic governance structures.

We will focus on three key aspects of Global Advocacy: venue selection, advocacy strategies and influence.

I. With globalization comes a remarkable growth in the number of venues or institutions before which interest groups can argue their positions. We will discuss how and why interest groups obtain access to various political institutions.

II. This explosion in possible venues, coupled with the growth of international and transnational NGOs, and the expansion of transnational advocacy networks, leads to a much more complex operating environment – with more opportunities but also more constraints. We will consider the political strategies groups employ including: issue prioritization, framing and argumentation, inside and outside tactic selection, media outreach and networking and coalition formation.

III. Concerted efforts by networks of like-minded activists have brought about significant policy change, be it the end of human rights abuses by the Argentine government; forcing global financial institutions like the World Bank to consider indigenous rights and environmental impacts; compelling multinational companies to stop dangerous marketing practices like the Nestle boycott campaign or getting gender-based violence on the global agenda. We will explore when global campaigns have been successful, when they have not and why.

Programme Fee: The program fee for students is € 600 and has to be paid within 14 days after confirmation. The fee includes accommodation, lunches, course material and the social programme. Attendees will be responsible for their own transportation costs to and from the University of Virginia. You will receive a notification whether you are admitted to the summer school by mid April. Payment of the attendance fee will confirm your participation. Students from outside the US who need a visa are expected to pay their fee within two weeks after they received their visa permit.

Scholarships: We have a very limited number of scholarships available. Only students who cannot apply for grants at their home institution or elsewhere are eligible to these scholarships. It is expected that you try to find scholarships yourself (see ECPR website for this). If you would like to apply for a scholarship, please indicate this below in addition to directly contacting the directors of the summer school, Prof. Christine Mahoney or Prof. Beyers

**Empirical Implications of Theoretical Models Europe Summer Institute 2011,
University of Mannheim, June 26 - July 9**

The objective of EITM is to evaluate the explanatory power of theoretical models and to equip junior researchers with the most sophisticated tools of analysis that enable them to conduct their research at the highest scholarly level. Andrew Martin and Randy Calvert (WashU) will teach the Theoretical and Methodological Foundation classes, followed by Michael Laver (New York University) on Agent Based Modeling. Will Lowe and Sven-Oliver Proksch (University of Mannheim) will teach the final class on Quantitative Analysis of Political Texts. Additionally, we offer a refresher course in Mathematics and R taught by Martin Elff (Essex).

Application: We welcome all applications by graduate students and junior faculty interested in formal theory and empirical analysis. The program is primarily directed towards political scientists but we very much welcome applications from other fields of social sciences. Prior training in both game theory and statistics is necessary to follow the courses. Ideally, applicants should have completed courses in these areas before participation. In addition, applicants should be willing to do prepare quite extensive readings before coming to Mannheim. Knowledge in R is also required and applicants are expected to have obtained basic knowledge before the beginning of the courses.

Graduate students who would benefit most from the program would have some training in both formal methodology and quantitative analysis, with advanced training in at least one of those, would have passed all exams, and would be well along in the dissertation project but able still to incorporate improvements enabled by the program. Likewise, applications from junior faculty looking to improve the dissertation for publication in a direction that incorporates EITM advances would be welcome. These describe the ideal applicants; interested students or junior faculty should not refrain from applying due to some perceived shortfall on any of these dimensions.

The *application deadline* for the June 2011 summer institute is *April 4, 2011*. Please make sure to send all necessary documents until this date. Applications that arrive after the deadline will not be considered. The applications will be processed within two weeks. Tuition is 1000 Euros. Another 500 Euros will be charged for Accommodation in double rooms. The tuition has to be payed upon acceptance to the program. Participants have to cover their travel costs. Let us know if we can be of any help if you apply for funding individually at other institutions.

Le programme est organisé par le " Réseau académique d'études juridiques sur l'immigration et l'asile en Europe " fondé avec le soutien financier du programme Odysseus de la Commission européenne et coordonné par l'Institut d'Etudes européennes de l'Université Libre de Bruxelles. Élise AUVACHEZ, « *Citoyennisation* » et consolidation d'entités supranationales : les cas de l'Union européenne et de l'Organisation des Nations Unies, thèse pour le doctorat en science politique sous la direction de Jane Jenson.

Résumé :

Le contexte contemporain est marqué dans la sphère politique par la multiplication des paliers de régulation. Une nouvelle structure de gestion des affaires publiques a émergé, caractérisée par la superposition, ou plutôt l'enchevêtrement, des institutions nationales, des entités infra-étatiques et des organisations supranationales (à caractère régional et international). L'État, tout en conservant un rôle privilégié, ne détient plus le monopole de la production de politiques ; la sphère nationale n'est plus le seul locus de la vie politique.

De telles dynamiques de changement n'ont pas laissé inchangés les contours de la citoyenneté, élément central de la régulation du politique. Les années 90 ont ainsi vu émerger une prolifération d'analyses concernant la dimension de plus en plus post/trans/supra-nationale, voire globale, de la citoyenneté ; selon ces travaux, le *locus* de la citoyenneté est de moins en moins national et de plus en plus supranational.

La thèse cherche à dépasser cette problématique du *locus* à partir d'une conception multiple et dynamique de la citoyenneté ; celle-ci est considérée comme une construction dont les contours mouvants évoluent dans le temps et l'espace. Les individus ne sont pas citoyens « par nature » ; ils le deviennent à travers un processus de « citoyennisation », au fur et à mesure que des entités politiques se constituent et se consolident. Les structures institutionnelles et les politiques publiques progressivement mises en place au sein des entités politiques supranationales créent des liens de citoyenneté avec les individus, et la nature de ces liens se transforme au fur et à mesure que les structures institutionnelles et politiques changent. C'est une analyse contextualisée de ces processus de « citoyennisation » en cours au niveau supranational que propose la thèse.

Dans cette perspective, elle s'interroge sur la signification des développements récents qui ont marqué l'Union européenne et l'Organisation des Nations Unies pour la construction d'une citoyenneté supranationale. Piliers importants de la structure de régulation multi-niveaux caractérisant la sphère politique contemporaine, ces deux entités se sont ces dernières années engagées dans un processus de réformes institutionnelles profondes. En s'appuyant notamment sur les concepts de « régime de citoyenneté » et de « gouvernance » et un cadre théorique institutionnaliste, la thèse propose une analyse de l'impact des changements institutionnels en cours au sein des Nations Unies et de l'Union européenne en termes de citoyennisation.

Résumé :

This thesis focuses on political party discourses and developments vis-à-vis European integration in the former CEE candidate states for EU membership, with particular attention to the case of Romania. Exploring the domestic dimension of these countries' accession provides insights into policy-making, party strategies, and party interaction in the post-communist context. The key objective of the project is to examine a number of factors inspired by the Western experience that drive the responses of political parties in regard to European integration. More specifically, the relevance of parties' (1) ideology, (2) relations to electorates, and (3) interactions within the party system make the purpose of investigation here. First, the role of ideology is scrutinised across the CEE region using statistical methods as well as a combination of party manifestos and expert survey data. The main conclusion to be drawn from the CEE analysis is that parties' ideological makeup represents a necessary yet insufficient consideration for how parties react to Europe. Therefore, the thesis suggests that in order to arrive at a more compelling explanation of parties' EU attitudes, the importance of electoral links and competition for office needs to be factored into the discussion, alongside political ideology. Given a series of methodological constraints and opportunities, the dynamic interaction between these three factors in influencing parties' European stances is assessed in the case of Romania. This in-depth study relies on secondary literature, different opinion polls, and qualitative information from various party and media materials in order to map five Romanian political parties ideologically, establish their party-type, and review their European orientations. The overall conclusion of the Romanian case study is that only the interplay between the three features – parties' ideology, their relationship with voters, and inter-party strategies – can offer a reliable guide to the positions adopted by political parties toward EU integration.

Résumé :

L'avènement des « musées de l'Europe » semble annoncer la disparition d'un modèle solidement institué d'outils de représentation symbolique de la nation (les

musées d'ethnologie et d'histoire nationales) ou venir s'y ajouter, et engendrer, de ce fait, l'apparition d'instruments « identitaires » européens. En quoi ces musées incarnent une innovation, un changement de modèle ? Pourquoi et pour qui sont-ils ou non un problème, ici et maintenant ? Incarnent-ils une forme d'abolition ou détournée de sauvetage, de revalorisation d'un modèle d'institution culturelle nationale, dans la mesure où ils en sont les héritiers directs et dans la mesure où leurs acteurs réaffirment la croyance dans la force performative – identitaire – de l'institution muséale ?

Visant à traiter ces interrogations, la thèse consiste en l'étude du processus, en cours, de production de musées de culture et d'histoire dédiés à l'Europe, abordé à travers nombre de questions corollaires qui nous ont permis d'avoir prise sur cet objet et ce terrain mouvant, multi-site et multi-temps. En quoi consistent ces musées, ouverts au public, restés à l'état de projet ou en cours de création ? Par qui sont-ils voulus, réalisés, financés ? Sur quoi reposent-ils en termes de collections, de « patrimoine » ? Qu'expose-t-il et que font-ils ? Pourquoi et comment les « musées de l'Europe » sont-ils au nombre de plusieurs ? Découlent-ils d'une volonté politique ou de plusieurs, et desquelles ? Quelles sont les stratégies d'action mises en œuvre pour réaliser les projets ? En éclairant ces questions, nous renseignons sur les conditions sociales et institutionnelles d'une certaine forme d'européanisation – que nous avons appelée européanisation culturelle pour mieux l'interroger –, à travers l'étude empirique d'un cas spécifique : la transformation contemporaine de musées d'ethnologie et d'histoire nationales et la création *ex nihilo* de « musées de l'Europe », à l'œuvre dans plusieurs pays européens depuis la fin des années 1980. L'objet du questionnement est de comprendre comment, pourquoi et par qui est construite et tente d'être institutionnalisée cette (nouvelle ?) catégorie muséale qui se révèle être hautement problématique et floue.

L'on sait que les responsables des institutions communautaires et européennes élaborent des outils, des programmes et des produits destinés à développer le sentiment d'appartenance à la « communauté imaginée » européenne, en privilégiant une action sur la culture, l'histoire et la mémoire. L'on pouvait donc logiquement penser, que les « musées de l'Europe » émergents relèvent de ce processus, de cette politique « d'identité » à l'échelle européenne. Nous avons voulu le vérifier. Ce faisant, nous nous sommes trouvé confronté à un véritable chantier, dans les divers sens du terme.

C'est sur ce chantier, matériel et symbolique, que nous avons évolué sur plusieurs années, en menant une enquête ethnographique et sociohistorique, rythmée par des observations et des participations *in situ*, des entretiens, un travail sur archives récentes et vivantes, la visite de musées et d'expositions, une veille médiatique permanente, afin d'identifier et de mettre en perspective les acteurs, les groupes, les processus, les activités, les opérations concrètes qui aspirent à « mettre l'Europe au musée » et à créer des institutions entièrement consacrées à cette fin. Mise en pratique de façon croisée et transversale, cette approche nous a permis de restituer et de comprendre la genèse, l'historicité et l'actualité de cette catégorie en formation, constitués par plusieurs musées ou projets de musées avortés ou en cours, unis par un même critère : être déclarés, par leurs acteurs, « musées de l'Europe »¹. Ces « musées », incomparables entre eux termes à termes, ont été appréhendés à travers leurs croisements et transferts plus que par stricte comparaison, afin de saisir la dynamique à l'œuvre à la fois dans sa dimension européenne (internationale et transnationale) et dans ses ancrages nationaux et locaux. A ce titre, une attention particulière a été accordée au « Réseau des musées de l'Europe », à ses membres et à ses non-membres, pour comprendre comment tente d'être structurée (organisée) et institutionnalisée cette catégorie muséale naissante.

Dans la première partie (Sociogenèse des « musées de l'Europe »), nous nous intéressons aux facteurs endogènes et exogènes, macrosociologiques et microsociologiques, liés à l'émergence de l'idée de « mettre l'Europe au musée », sans postuler le primat d'un niveau sur l'autre, mais en entrecroisant les niveaux d'analyse. Cela nous permet d'en savoir plus sur la composition et les modalités de structuration de la catégorie naissante des « musées de l'Europe », que nous resituons dans les cadres temporels et spatiaux de son émergence. Ce faisant, nous comprenons que l'idée même est liée à des acteurs et à des institutions diverses, plus qu'à une politique muséale cohérente. Dans le premier chapitre (Au croisement de l'histoire muséale, de l'histoire des sciences et de l'histoire politique), nous revenons ainsi sur les conditions conjoncturelles qui ont favorisé l'impulsion et la prolifération, toutefois localisée dans le temps et dans l'espace, des projets de « musées de l'Europe ». Dans le deuxième chapitre (Pléthore de projets. Entre refondations et créations ex nihilo), nous découvrons qui sont les entrepreneurs de ces nouveaux musées (culturels, scientifiques, politiques, administratifs, économiques), en mettant au jour leurs positions et trajectoires sociales et professionnelles. Ici, nous marquons la distinction entre les cas de refondation et ceux de création *ex nihilo*, qui n'obéissent pas tout à fait aux mêmes règles.

Dans la deuxième partie (Les images de l'Europe : la muséalisation en idées et en pratiques), nous nous intéressons à la mise en œuvre des projets de « musées de l'Europe » et aux modalités concrètes d'entrée de l'Europe au musée. Dans le troisième chapitre (La division sociale du travail de représentation de l'Europe au musée), nous expliquons pourquoi « l'Europe » peut être considérée, dans l'analyse, comme un objet muséal non identifié, en analysant notamment les divergences de vue et les facteurs agissant sur la production des *images* de « l'Europe ». Dans le quatrième chapitre (Plus que des musées, des centres d'interprétation de l'Europe. Simple question de terminologie ?), nous nous posons du point de vue des enjeux de collection, d'exposition et d'incarnation de l'Europe, en pénétrant dans les coulisses des musées et des équipes de conception.

Dans la troisième partie (De l'illusion au désenchantement : les difficultés d'institutionnalisation), nous analysons les raisons des difficultés – ou de l'échec – des « musées de l'Europe » ; pour l'heure, cela s'entend au vu de l'actualité et de l'évolution quotidienne de l'objet. Dans le cinquième chapitre (Des « groupes d'intérêt » : entre désir d'influence et recherche des soutiens), le décryptage des montages opérationnels et des stratégies de justification, de communication et de séduction pour convaincre, qui accompagnent *le désir* d'institutionnalisation de ces nouveaux musées, permettent de voir quels registres, arguments et techniques de représentation sont utilisés pour « porter la voix » des « musées de l'Europe », de manière collective et individuellement, par projet. Dans le sixième chapitre (Entre absence de volonté politique et interventionnisme), en retraçant l'histoire des projets en regard des jeux politiques dans lesquels ils sont pris, nous montrons que les « musées de l'Europe » sont un objet politique problématique et chaud, à l'origine des difficultés que rencontrent leurs entrepreneurs. Cela tient aux enjeux symboliques, politiques, religieux, mais aussi économiques, inhérents à la muséalisation de « l'Europe », sur lesquels nous insistons dans ce chapitre.

À l'issue de ce développement, nous comprenons que les difficultés d'institutionnalisation des « musées de l'Europe » tiennent à deux phénomènes, entrecroisés. D'une part, « l'Europe » semble être un objet inapproprié au musée, et d'autre part, le musée, en tant qu'institution culturelle, semble rivé à l'échelon national, notamment en termes de dépendance vis-à-vis des structures administratives et politiques nationales. Il apparaît, dans sa forme *traditionnelle*, inadapté pour représenter la nouvelle forme de pouvoir qu'incarne l'Union européenne et l'horizon culturel et civilisationnel que constitue, pour certains, « l'Europe ». Ainsi, les « musées de l'Europe » se révèlent être un signe, un symptôme, un instrument et un prisme d'observation et d'analyse privilégié de la « politique d'identité » européenne. Ils permettent de

comprendre quelles formes elle prend, de manière non linéaire, au sein et en dehors du giron des institutions politiques européennes et communautaires, pour elles ou au contraire, *contre* elles. Ainsi, dans cette thèse, nous abordons concrètement la question de savoir ce que les notions et les registres de culture, de civilisation, d'histoire, de peuple et de mémoire, posent comme problème(s) aux champs culturels, politiques et administratifs, dès lors qu'on tente de les penser et de les représenter « au-delà » du seul prisme du national. Apportant une contribution à la sociologie de l'action publique dans le domaine culturelle, à la sociologie des institutions, à la sociologie de l'europanisation et à la sociologie des musées, cette thèse permet de comprendre pourquoi la culture est un objet particulier dans le processus identifié comme relevant de l'europanisation des politiques publiques et invite à remettre cette notion même en question. C'est, finalement, un processus de production d'images de « l'Europe de la culture » polymorphe et paradoxal du point de vue de l'action publique, que la thèse met au jour.

Résumé :

La politique de défense est restée traditionnellement en dehors des compétences de l'Union européenne (UE), demeurant une politique régaliennne sous l'autorité de l'Etat-nation. De multiples façons, cette « exception » de la défense a favorisé sa mise à l'écart de l'analyse des politiques publiques, et plus particulièrement des travaux consacrés aux politiques européennes. Néanmoins l'évolution du contexte sécuritaire depuis la chute du mur de Berlin a mis en avant le besoin de l'affranchir de cet exceptionnalisme pour aborder la défense avec les mêmes outils que toute autre politique publique. La modernisation des forces armées nationales et des politiques de défense en Europe à partir du milieu des années 1990, ainsi que la création inattendue d'une défense européenne, interrogent l'influence des acteurs hétéroclites à tous les niveaux de gouvernance dans l'Union européenne. La France et le Royaume-Uni ont réorganisé leurs forces armées sur les concepts d'interarmisation et d'interopérabilité et sur la mise en réseaux les sous-tendant, soulignant la priorité donnée aux opérations en coalitions multinationales. Bien que l'UE n'ait pas dicté ces évolutions, faute d'en avoir l'autorité légitime, elle a néanmoins servi de catalyseur pour ce changement de politique publique et a constitué un forum favorisant le transfert de politiques publiques grâce à des mécanismes tels que la socialisation. Cette étude de cas permet ainsi d'exposer par quels processus l'europanisation des politiques publiques influence le domaine régalien de la politique de défense nationale, que ce soit par ses structures formelles ou par le jeu de réseaux informels.

A position as Associate Professor in Comparative Politics is open at the Department of Comparative Politics, University of Bergen.

The Department of Comparative Politics offers an inspiring research environment for the study of political institutions, organizations, processes and behavior at the local, national and international level. The faculty and students at the department are active in academic debates nationally and internationally. Currently the Department administers two bachelor programs, in Comparative Politics and in European Studies, as well as a graduate program in Comparative Politics. The Department's academic activities are organized in four research groups:

- European Politics
- Welfare and Democracy
- Democracy and Development
- Research Methods

The successful applicant is expected to be part of and contribute to the research and academic community in one (or more) of these research groups. The position of Associate Professor at the Department of Comparative Politics includes in addition to research; teaching and supervision at the undergraduate and graduate level. A proven track record of attracting external research funding is given weight in the evaluation of applicants. The person we are searching must agree to participate in administrative work.

In order to assess the qualifications of the applicants, the candidates deemed most qualified based on an assessment of their written application and scientific work will be invited to Bergen for a trial lecture and interview with members of the Department.

Qualifications

Scientific merits and teaching experience must be documented. The successful applicant must have a doctorate in comparative politics or corresponding qualifications. Applicants must document ability to publish in the field of comparative politics in internationally recognised publications. The ability to initiate and manage research projects will be assessed. The evaluation of the scientific work will emphasize research published the last five years.

Weight will be placed on pedagogical skills. The evaluation of the candidate will be based on pedagogical qualifications, including pedagogical education/training, the presentation of academic work, and experience from supervising students, and teaching as well as other pedagogical matters. The development of teaching material will be considered.

Administrative experience and ability to disseminate research to a non-academic audience and participate in public debates will be considered. Ability to cooperate with students and staff shall be emphasized.

The teaching language is Norwegian and English (approximately 50% of our courses are taught in English). It is assumed that newly-employed staff in academic positions, who do not already master a Scandinavian language, are to obtain within three years knowledge of Norwegian or another Scandinavian language at an equivalent standard to level three in the Norwegian for Foreigners courses provided at the Department of Language and Communications. The University provides such course.

Basic teaching training is a requirement. The appointee to this position will be offered appropriate pedagogical training if this requirement has not been met previous to appointment.

About the position

Salary for associate professors starts at level 57 (code 1011/LR24.1) of the civil service pay scale; currently NOK 448.400,- gross, from which 2% amount an obligatory pension contribution will be deducted. In the case of particularly highly qualified applicants, a higher salary may be considered.

IPSA-ECPR Joint Conference – Whatever happened to North-South? 16-19 February, University of São Paulo, Brazil

"The IPSA-ECPR Joint Conference titled 'Whatever Happened to North-South?' wrapped up on Saturday, February 19 after three-and-a-half days of panels discussing the continued relevance of the international North-South divide. The event was hosted by the Brazilian Political Science Association (BPSA) at the University of São Paulo. More than 700 participants were welcomed onto the sprawling grounds of the University of São Paulo campus. In this first-ever collaboration between IPSA and ECPR, participants from Germany to Argentina and (of course) Brazil took part in thought-provoking panels grouped under three themes: (1) changing patterns of international relations/regional integration; (2) political regimes, democratic consolidation and the quality of democracy; and (3) economic trends and political, social and cultural changes. In particular, we were very pleased that a large number of local academics attended, taking advantage of the proximity of a major international conference to share ideas with colleagues from around the world. IPSA extends a warm word of thanks to all participants and to ECPR, BPSA and the Local Organizing Committee for helping to make this event a great success."

This is how the IPSA newsletter presented the inter-institutional conference which took place in São Paulo last February. Among the several panels dealing with regional integration, I have selected two dealing in special with regional integration parliaments. The first panel, entitled "Multilevel governance and regional integration worldwide: the parliamentary dimension", chaired by Olivier Costa and Clarissa Dri, aimed at discussing the role of regional parliaments in terms of their structure, powers and actors. Olivier Costa and Nathalie Brack presented a critical reassessment of the role of the European Parliament (EP) in Europe's integration. The authors argued that the democratic ideology can be considered as the principal source for the increase of EP's powers and that it is possible to determine its nature and to define the conditions under which this ideology could be decisive, testing this hypotheses empirically on the process leading to the European Constitution and, after its failure, to the Lisbon treaty. Cristina Fasone showed that the Baltic Sea region can be seen as laboratory of inter-parliamentary dialogue, which is an interesting case-study due to the high concentration of inter-parliamentary *fora* created. The paper assesses why these institutions have been created, in which period and which are the common constitutional and political features of the participants. Karina Mariano brought the discussion to South America, discussing the potential role of the Mercosur Parliament (Parlasur) which is mainly related to its unexpected consequences in the regional political system. Maria Claudia Drummond presented the functioning of the Brazilian parliamentary delegation to Mercosur in the Brazilian Congress. The author examines its institutionalization process over the years, arguing that it is one of the most structured national delegations within Parlasur.

The panel "Constitutionalization and regional integration: EU and Latin America compared", chaired by Berthold Rittberger and Christian Arnold, intended to bring together research on the constitutionalization of regional integration schemes. One core

aspect of constitutionalization processes and outcomes is the role and power accorded to supranational parliamentary institutions, such as the EP in the EU. The panel aimed therefore at comparing the experiences made in the EU and Latin American context, wishing to identify common causal paths that lead from regional integration schemes that lack a parliamentary representation towards regional integration with a parliamentary institution and, eventually, expanding competencies. Andrés Malamud and Clarissa Dri applied the spillover theory to the structure and performance of Parlasur, in order to assess whether it has produced, or may produce, some kind of spillover by either fostering new regional dynamics or cajoling national governments into upgrading their commitment to the region. Jürgen Rüländ and Karsten Bechle compared regional parliamentary bodies in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and Mercosur. By applying norm diffusion theory, they have shown that these assemblies perform functions which are neither geared towards a deepening of regional integration through legalization and constitutionalization, nor towards the solution of collective action problems or democratizing regional governance. Rather, they have been established to retain, through a process of localization, the decision-making methods and corporatist logic proper to this regional organizations. Juliana Erthal and Juan Albarracín have also presented a comparative analysis that searched to address the main features and competences of the Andean Parliament and the Central American Parliament, focusing on the direct elections held last year. Finally, Berthold Rittberger and Christian Arnold's paper investigated legalization in the context of Mercosur, understood as the inclusion of legal principles or legal discourse in the dispute resolution methods. The authors analyzed the evolution of the Mercosur dispute settlement system in the light of a rationalist institutionalist perspective, revealing the limits of the power-based explanations.

In the discussions, Berthold Rittberger pointed out that we have to press the current agenda of regional integration studies to find a common frame – not necessarily a unique theory – to study the development of parliaments in different institutional settings. Maybe there are some lessons to be taken from existing clarifications in the study of parliaments, but what value do they have when it comes to regional integration? Maybe we need alternative clarifications. Theories of comparative politics could be used (to study for instance behavior of MPs), as well as international relations and institutional theories (institutional design and change, why regional institutions gain competences over time). According to Olivier Costa, defining what a parliament is and making predictions about its future is risky, because sometimes things happen even if we are not expecting them theoretically. Also, it is important to look at informal processes going on on Asia or South America, because this dimension may be more important in these continents than it is in Europe.

The Commanding Heights of the European Union. The European Council: institution, actors, resources.
Colloque organisé par l'Institut d'Etudes Européennes et le CEVIPOL (Université libre de Bruxelles),
10-11 mars 2011, Bruxelles

Bien que située au sommet de l'ordre politique européen et au cœur des récentes réformes des traités, le Conseil européen n'a suscité qu'un très faible intérêt de la part des politistes. Partant de ce constat, cette conférence s'est interrogée sur la dimension interne du Conseil européen. Considérant le Conseil européen comme une institution évolutive, traversée par des logiques plurielles et parfois contradictoires, elle visait à répondre à des questions telles que : quelles sont les nouvelles caractéristiques institutionnelles du Conseil européen? Quel est son rôle au sein du régime politique européen et quelles relations entretient-il avec la présidence tournante ? Quels sont les effets de ces réformes sur les perceptions des citoyens, des médias et de la société civile ? Afin de répondre à ces questions, la conférence s'articulait autour de 4 axes :

Axe 1 : le Conseil européen comme institution

La première intervention, par E. Mourlon-Druol (LSE), visait à s'interroger sur le rôle des Sommets européens dans la coopération politique européenne de 1961 à 1981. Etudiant les interactions entre coopération politique européenne et Conseil européen, il a montré dans quelle mesure ces interactions ont évolué au fil du temps et comment cela a affecté le fonctionnement de la Communauté européenne, principalement en élargissant le cadre de la coopération politique. Ensuite, la contribution de Y.-S. Rittelmeyer (ULB) analysait la consécration institutionnelle du Conseil européen et a évalué le rôle des textes formels pour le Conseil européen. Il a souligné la secondarité des textes législatifs par rapport aux textes politiques, le poids relatif des changements impliqués par le nouveau traité et a insisté sur le rôle majeur des acteurs dans la consécration institutionnelle du Conseil européen. Il a également montré que cette reconnaissance institutionnelle est liée à une atténuation de l'image intergouvernementale de cette institution et du clivage intergouvernemental/supranational comme l'illustre la mise en avant d'une « méthode de l'Union ». La troisième contribution par M. Mangenot (Université de Strasbourg) portait sur le rôle du secrétariat général du Conseil. Il a expliqué que le traité de Lisbonne a entraîné la séparation du Conseil européen et Conseil des Ministres et a généré un triangle institutionnel à quatre côtés. Pourtant, il n'existe qu'une seule administration : le secrétariat général du Conseil. M. Mangenot a montré que le secrétariat général du Conseil constitue le rare lieu de coordination de cette situation complexe, devant assurer un équilibre intra- et inter-institutionnel.

Axe 2 : Le Conseil européen comme *policy-maker*

Une contribution par P. Alexandrova, A. Timmermans (Montesquieu Institute & Universiteit Leiden) et M. Carammia (University of Catania) a passé en revue le policy-agenda du Conseil européen de 1975 à 2010 en utilisant la théorie des équilibres ponctués. Cette analyse quantitative basée sur les conclusions des Conseils européens a démontré que les sujets dominant l'agenda varient dans le temps et qu'ils ne sont pas constamment présents. Après cette étude panoramique, X. Barros (EUI) s'est intéressée au cas précis du rôle du Conseil européen dans la lutte anti-terroriste. Elle a passé en revue l'attitude du Conseil européen vis-à-vis des « Focusing events » depuis 1995 et a énoncé des explications d'intervention ou de non-intervention du Conseil européen.

Axe 3 : la Présidence de l'UE et le Conseil européen : complémentaire ou en compétition ?

La contribution de D. Allerkamp (Universität Mannheim) s'est s'interrogée sur les conséquences de la rétrogradation de la présidence tournante sur les rôles de cette

dernière (*leader, broker*, représentant et administrateur). Elle a montré que pour le nouveau traité entraînait des changements fondamentaux pour certaines fonctions telles que le rôle de *leader* et de représentant. De même, le rôle d'administrateur peut être accru à l'avenir car la présidence en exercice est prise entre l'héritage de ses prédécesseurs, les événements contextuels, les exigences du président permanent et les programmes déjà en place. A. M. Fernandez Pasarin (Universidad Autonoma de Barcelona et Sciences Po Paris) a expliqué que les réformes de la présidence ont des conséquences politiques importantes car elles mettent en mouvement un phénomène de communautarisation et de reconfiguration des relations. Elle a démontré que l'institution de la présidence s'est transformée dans le sens d'une plus grande supranationalisation à travers la révision de la représentation des Etats-membres dans l'UE. Son analyse s'est concentrée sur deux aspects – les modèles de la Présidence (mode de fonctionnement) et la finalité et les fonctions de la présidence (fonctions assignées)- dans le temps long pour montrer que ce design institutionnel s'est transformé de façon fondamentale. Enfin, S. Van Hecke et P. Bursens (Universiteit Antwerp) ont analysé les conséquences du traité de Lisbonne sur la présidence tournante à travers un cas d'étude : la présidence belge. Ils ont montré de quelle façon cette présidence belge pouvait être qualifiée de « succès » en expliquant son renforcement de la méthode communautaire, son rôle de serviteur de H. Van Rompuy et sa priorité donnée aux résultats par rapport à ses intérêts propres. Ils ont ensuite présenté les conséquences pour les futures présidences tournantes et le leadership collectif qui peuvent être tirées de l'exercice belge.

Axe 4 : Incarnation et Légitimation de l'UE

Pour clôturer la conférence, L. Hoffman (Tilburg University), H. Mayer et K. Nicolaïdis (Oxford University) sont revenus sur le *Wise People Group*, dernier groupe de réflexion mandaté par le Conseil européen. Ils ont retracé son parcours et les différents obstacles qu'il a rencontré afin de produire une réflexion plus large sur le sens, les résultats et l'intérêt de telles activités et rapports. Cette présentation s'est suivie d'une réflexion de F. Forêt (ULB) sur les aspects communicationnels de l'Europe post-Lisbonne. Décrivant la communication dans l'UE comme une « consociational polity », il a relevé les indicateurs de changements structurels (relocalisation à Bruxelles, déclin des présidences nationales, diminution du nombre des journalistes à Bruxelles, faible notoriété du Conseil européen). Puis il a décliné l'histoire communicationnelle du Conseil européen selon 3 registres : histoire de famille, histoire de pouvoir, histoire du « business as usual ». Il a conclu à la nécessité de reconnaître la prééminence de cette dernière, tout en soulignant la résistance de l'histoire de famille et la persistante tentation de l'histoire de pouvoir. Enfin, C. Lord (ARENA, University of Oslo) a exploré les problèmes de la représentation composée de l'UE post-Lisbonne. Il a souligné les mérites de cette forme de représentation tout en expliquant qu'à la fois les espoirs et les déceptions des institutions et politiques de représentation de l'UE s'expliquent par le développement de cette dernière.
